





SHARE is a small group of women who have been following a range of Bible studies for several years. Our favourite studies are provided by York Courses. The York Courses produce study materials for Advent and Lent. The Advent course is 4 sessions and the Lent course 5 sessions. We tend to start our study early because of commitments at the festive events of Christmas and Easter.

The Advent study this year is titled "Who are we praying to?". The four sessions are ;

- 1. Praying with perseverance
- 2. Praying in the face of unanswered prayer
- 3. Praying for the marginalised
- 4. Prayer and covenant.

For each session the participants have a booklet that gives Bible readings and some discussion and questions for discussion at the meeting. For the group there is a CD that gives some description of the thinking of the person or people who have developed the course and discussion with other people. By the time this is published SHARE will be half way through the course but that doesn't mean you can't do this study on your own or with others at a time convenient to you. Our Minister's Message Reverend Scott Blythe



I don't know about the rest of you, but the last few weeks have felt as if someone had thrown the switch on the lights around us! As I reflect upon the change in our light - which is of course completely normal - I realised that we have had a gentle autumn period with lots of light and less storms to drive away the leaves. In fact, in the last few weeks in which we have had some beautiful days, I have been really struck by the browns and yellows, reds and oranges that we have been able to enjoy this year.

Yet, we are finding ourselves travelling at a rate of knots towards the Christmas Festival! It always seems to accelerate when we move beyond October. As we approach this celebration of God's Incarnation - being born one of us it is significant that we reflect on the light in our northern hemisphere of the world.

The Sunday Club have been enjoying stories from the

gospels of Matthew and Mark, learning more about Jesus Power to heal. Jesus does not hesitate to touch the sick, healing instantly and bringing new beginning to lives. We have learned that through healing, Jesus showed God's love, not just healing the sick, but from other situations like sadness and difficult relationships. We have also been very crafty last month. Have you seen the potato print freeze in the Large Hall at Netherlee? As we thought about feeding the 4,000 (if you don't believe our numbers check out Matthew 15:32-39) we tried to 'print' 4,000 people. We were a few short, but it helped us imagine such a large crowd.

As the Remembrance Service was at Stamperland this year, we looked at why the red poppy is the symbol we traditionally use during the preceding lesson. To our surprise, Duncan was wearing a purple poppy, which we learned is a symbol of remembrance in the United Kingdom for animals that served during wartime. This included horses, ponies, dogs and pigeons, many of whom lost their lives too. We finger painted poppy posters which were then added to the poppy display in Stamperland Church vestibule. On Remembrance Sunday itself, we enjoyed hearing how the youth organisations had helped the war effort in both the first and second world wars. We fell silent with the rest of the congregation before heading to the small hall where Helen, our Sunday Club Superintendent, had prepared games and activities not only for the Sunday Clubbers, but the Netherlee Anchor Boys, Stamperland Cubs and many other children who joined us. We made beautiful poppies which were then carried by those taking part in the parade which followed. It was lovely to make some new friends too.

Returning to theme the of healing, which seemed appropriate after Remembrance, we reflected on how Jesus wants to forgive us all and make us clean and free of that most deadly of all disease – sin. Some challenging discussions for our members, but we are proud of how the children deal with our topics, often asking questions that shows they are thinking about what we do each week.

Advent is now upon us and we are getting our entry ready for the Christmas Tree festival. The Sunday Club and Senior Sunday Club members will be getting involved in some of the services leading up to Christmas, the highlight being the Nativity service on the 15th of December. With our party on the 19th we have lots to look forward to.

We extend a warm welcome to all children P1 to P7 as well as S1 and beyond! Just come along, we'd love to see you. Joining us for the first time? Don't hesitate to get in touch via the Church Office to find out more, or simply meet us on a Sunday morning.

We will be taking a break after our Nativity Service and party, with Sunday Club returning on the 5th of January. The Sunday Club children, young adults and leaders would like to wish you all a very Merry Christmas and a healthy and happy 2020!

The foods chosen for January are as follows:

Tinned soup / packet cuppa soup, Breakfast cereals/porridge, Tinned spaghetti / macaroni / pasta shapes, Tinned baked beans/vegetables, Tinned meat/tuna/salmon, Instant Mash Potato, Sponge pudding (tinned)

Ladies/Gents toiletries including sanitary products.

UHT Milk and Creamed Rice or Custard (Tinned) are acceptable at any time.

If you would prefer to donate any other items please refer to the list as shown. If you are unable to carry heavy items please do not be deterred from donating, there are always lighter options available on the list.

The delivery of food taken to Barrhead at the end of October weighed 52.9kg. This will feed 5 single people for three days. The client numbers are at a steady average of 40 per week. If 40 single packages

are distributed that amounts to almost half a tonne per week, it is easy to see why stocks go down.

We are going to take part again this year in the **Advent Foodbank Collection**. Netherlee are going to join with us in this project. The season of Advent is a time of giving and the idea is that we would donate an item to the Foodbank each day of Advent. The food can be collected at home and brought to the Watchnight Service or if you prefer, can be brought to the church on a weekly basis, on a Sunday morning, or on a Wednesday morning to Open Door between 10.00 and 12.00. **Items should not be relating to Christmas** as it will be into January before the food is delivered to the Foodbank. Any item as shown on the Foodbank Shopping List would be greatly appreciated. Thank you again for your continued support which is very much appreciated. Again we would ask that items donated are within the "**best before**" date. The Foodbank will not distribute food which is out of date.

Being the Christmas holiday break for most organisa-

Treasurer's Report

Cumulative to October 2019



General Fund - At the end of October, the General Fund shows a surplus of £17566. This is £11,801 ahead of the Budget and £128 ahead of the same time last year on a like for like basis. I would highlight the following:

Income - Against budget the offerings including tax recovery on gift aid contributions are ahead by £5,646. The only heading showing a shortfall is under WFO offerings. This is down to members moving from the WFO scheme to the Gift Aid scheme. The income from the Use of Premises is £2,753 down on the budget. As reported in my previous report we had lost 2 tenants, but I am pleased to report that one of them, Enjoy a Ball, has started again under a new franchisee. At this stage it is expected that the deficit under this heading will have grown to circa £3,500 by the end of the year. Clarkston after School Care started their non - term club for when the schools are on holiday and the October holiday generated an income, to our Church, of £600.

Against last year, after 10 months, our Income is down only £997.

Expenditure - Ministry costs are running close to budget and last year's figures.

The other costs are showing a saving against budget of £8,430. The two main areas of saving are under R & M(£4,020) and Heat and Light (£1,749). With only 2 months remaining in this year it is expected that R & M will, at the end of year, still show a surplus against budget similar to that currently showing. The saving against budget under Heat and Light at the end of the year will be dependent on the weather conditions in the final 2 months of the year. Although it is expected that the surplus will decline in the last 2 months it is hoped that it will still be in surplus at the year end.

The Total Expenditure against last year shows a saving of £1,224

Reserves - Our Reserves have received £14,487 in dividends and interest. £4,616 has been spent from the Thomas White Legacy Fund, as reported previously. In November £5,000 has been taken from this fund and sent to St Rollox Parish Church. This was in response to the appeal from Glasgow Presbytery for funds to help St Rollox purchase furnishings and equipment



for their new church. Their original church was subject to a compulsory purchase order by Glasgow Council in order to make way for a new road. The appeal gave an estimated cost of £156,000, more than half of which is being funded by the General Trustees

and grants received by St Rollox directly from external sources. St Rollox is very much a community church. The roll is 72 but on a Sunday the numbers are around 100 of which the majority are foreigners/students. The area is home to immigrants and asylum seekers. They run a community café and 2 days a week offer English classes and support to complete government benefit funding and other applications.

To date the Common Good Fund has dispersed £4,806, mainly to the East Renfrewshire Good Causes Fund.

Investments - The Investment Committee have reviewed, over the summer months, the performance of the 2 portfolios we hold with Hargreaves Lansdown. We have been happy with the dividends (£40,000) received over the last 4 years on our original investment of £300,000. The growth performance has however been disappointing. The funds have underperformed against their benchmarks in the last 4 years and although HL could give reasons for this what they failed to do was convince us that the performance of the portfolios against their benchmarks would improve in the foreseeable future.

The Investment Committee examined the performance of other investment platforms and recommended to the Session that we withdraw £100,000 from the HL portfolios and invest the proceeds with the Church of Scotland Investment Trust. Their portfolios have given, in the last 4 years. a similar income to that we have received from HL but their growth performance has been better than that achieved by HL. The Session, at their November meeting approved the recommendation from the Investment Committee.

The Investment Committee will continue to monitor the performance of these investments.

The family has expressed gratitude for everyone's support. Please continue to pray for Kasia and her family at this time.

<u>Our Growth Continues</u>: In November BB Companies across the UK have to report their membership numbers to HQ. We were pleased to be able to report a fourth successive year of growth. In November 2015 we had 27 boys across all sections. The figure for 1 November 2019 is 66 boys, with new recruits having arrived since this date and more on the horizon. We are so grateful to all who have made this possible, from staff, parents and the boys themselves for spreading the word and bringing their friends.

Remembrance Service: We were pleased to have 30 boys and staff from all sections in attendance at this year's Remembrance Service. In addition to this being a hugely important event in its own right, it was great to see such a strong turnout from other Netherlee & Stamperland uniformed organisations, and a pleasure to join them in a post service parade led by our friends at 231 BB.

Anchor Boys (Monday 6pm - 7pm): A huge part of our growth over recent years has come from some healthy competition amongst the Anchor Boys for recruitment badges. We were therefore delighted to be able to present Angus Mitchell with his gold recruitment badge for having secured five new members to date, an achievement that received plaudits of BB CEO Bill Stevenson and Scotland Director John Sharp. A few of the boys have silver recruitment badges, and have plenty of time to follow in Angus' footsteps and convert them into a gold.

Since the last edition the Anchors have enjoyed their Halloween party, a Christian themed puppet show in the sanctuary, and the first airing of the trampette and box of the session. 14 of the boys also attended the Battalion Lego morning in Ibrox Parish Church, attended by around 40 members from throughout greater Glasgow. Recent Bible readings have included the Para-

-ble of the Prodigal Son and Jesus calming the storm.

Junior Section (Tues 7pm – 8.45pm): A video of a game of musical chairs at Junior Section's Halloween party became an in-

Netherlee Forum Session 2019 - 2020 Sheena Wurthmann



The schedule of meetings for the new session is as follows:

We would encourage you to come along and enjoy the various talks. The meetings are held in the Lesser Sanctuary at Netherlee starting at 7.30. They last about 45 minutes to allow for time for questions and answers. We finish the meeting with tea.

In October, the Forum was delighted to hear from David Beckett about his travels in Louisiana and the Mississippi Delta. David's journey around that part of United States was motivated by his well known love of music. He and his wife Pauline visited many sites associated with songs, creating their own vivid account of twentieth century American history through the music of the era.

David's main point was that much of the American experience is immortalised in popular song. Traumatic episodes have remained in public consciousness thanks in part to songs that captured the emotions of the time. Bob Dylan's song The Death of Emmett Till is about the lynching of an African American teenager in 1955. The song conveys the terrible injustice faced by African Americans at that time. David explained that music can help people to process their emotions as they reflect upon the troubling events of the past.

David and Pauline visited many places associated with American jazz, blues and soul music. They started their journey in New Orleans and travelled up the Mississippi Delta to Baton Rouge, Lafayette, Natchez, Vicksburg and

Clarkesdale before returning to New Orleans via Greenwood and Zachary. They visited the site of the Rhythm Night Club in Natchez where 209 people died when the club caught fire in April 1940. The many songs about the fire give the impression the fire marked the loss of a major cultural institution, helping

people to process their grief. David and Pauline also visited the Tallahatchie Bridge in Greenwood; the Ground Zero Blues Club in Clarkesdale, Mississippi; and the famous Clarkesdale crossroad where blues musician Robert Johnson allegedly sold his soul to the devil in exchange for musical success.

It was a pleasure to hear from David – a familiar face in Netherlee Church – about his musical pilgrimage around the Mississippi Delta. As David said, music sends a message to the soul better than anything else. In November, historian Dr Lesley Orr will address the Forum on women's suffrage and the Church of Scotland.

The meeting on the 17th December will be a presentation by Neil Young. Neil is the Youth Team Leader of St Paul's Youth Forum which has

changed things in Blackhill. The project started in 1995 as an opportunity to play football but it has expanded and diversified. As the project has developed the level of crime and gang activity has diminished. Neil is going to talk about "The little black bit at the end of the golden banana". Come along and hear this inspiring story

The speaker on 20th January meeting will be Rev. David Coleman. David is the chaplain to Eco-Congregation Scotland and will be talking about Creation Time and celebrating the environment. I hope there will be a good attendance at this meeting as the congregation prepare to work towards an eco-congregation award.


"Netherlee Set to Unveil its First Living Advent Calendar".

Love Actually

Every Boxing Day people across the land resolve that next Christmas will be different. In January, when the bills arrive, they promise that next Christmas will be simpler, less indulgent and cheaper. According to Money Supermarket, almost 10% of people will still be paying for Christmas well into next year. Perhaps next year, by refusing to conform to every tradition and everyone's expectations, we will recapture the wonder, the magic and the awe of Christmas and 'remember what it's all about'.

November magazines include articles on how to approach Christmas – 'Twenty Six Ways to Simplify Christmas'; or 'Five Reasons Why I'm Not Simplifying Christmas'. There are some radical work-saving, stress-busting, money-saving strategies out there. One woman recommends leaving the Christmas tree fully decorated all year. Hers has been in the corner of the sitting room, festooned in tinsel, baubles, lights and all, for *sixteen* years. It's true. For most of the year it is wrapped in sheets with the reminder, 'Do not open until December'.

Perhaps, after all, even on Christmas Day, reflecting on how simple or how lavish it has been is to miss the point. Maybe, as we approach Christmas, we do not need a to-do-list and a credit card so much as a Grinch-like revelation:

'Then the Grinch thought of something he hadn't before!
What if Christmas, he thought, doesn't come from a store?
What if Christmas ... perhaps ... means a little bit more!'
(Dr Seuss, How the Grinch Stole Christmas!)

A German proverb goes: 'The main thing is that the main thing remains the main thing'. That seems a pretty good definition of simplicity to me: recognising the extraneous and superfluous for what it is and focusing on 'the main thing'. Authentic simplicity has to be an inward reality before it bears the fruit of an outward lifestyle. Attempts to create the outer beauty without the inner actuality are doomed to legalism and frustration.

'The main thing' is to recognise the significance of that first Christmas, the Nativity. The birth of Jesus Christ was marked by astonishing simplicity. The highpoint of history, the climax of eternity, was not marked with grandeur, pomp and pageant. Rather, a pregnant teenager had no option but to deliver



her child in the stark and smelly surroundings of a stable, the only warmth provided by the body heat of sheltering animals. The first visitors were shepherds, who were considered the lowest of the low. Jesus, the Bible tells us, did not come with maj-

esty and opulence, but 'full of grace and truth', to reveal God – a God who is love – and to bridge the gap between us and that lavishly loving God.

Christmas is ultimately about love ... actually. As Christina Rossetti's carol puts it, 'Love came down at Christmas, Love all lovely, Love divine; Love was born at Christmas.' Perhaps, as we make our plans, we should be less concerned with how simple or extravagant our Christmas will be. Perhaps the touchstone of all that we do should be love: and how we respond to the extravagant love of God and how we love those around us.
